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Journal #2: Spirituality of the Heart – Personal Reflections

AN ASSIGNMENT SUBMITTED TO DR. CARMEL DAVIS IN PARTIAL FULFILLMENT FOR THE CLASS REQUIREMENTS OF THEO6018 SPIRITUALITY OF THE HEART AS PART OF A MASTER OF THEOLOGY PROGRAMME

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Having studied the spirituality of the heart (its scriptural basis, tradition, and theology), I present in this journal entry three areas of reflection centring on the *renewal of my heart* (or, receiving a *new heart*): informative insights, challenging conclusions, and life-changing lessons.

Informative Insights

Even though it is God's design to bring about a new creation – a new earth and a new heaven – the *renewal of my own heart* is an integral dimension of this plan. In this, I can be reassured by the fact that God himself promises to achieve what God requires of his people (Ezek 36:25-27).¹ Based on the new covenant, I know that it is by Jesus Christ that this promise is fulfilled. He is the mediator of the new covenant, and it is he who renews my heart.

Having had my heart renewed by God, I believe that my new heart is God-given and good. However, I also realize that I can and must go deeper to find, at the core of my being, the Spirit of God – which is the life-gift of God and the love of God. I sin when I am distracted from this new heart.

To the degree that I believe my new heart to be the sacred place where God meets me, I can experience, in the words of Fallon, "rightness of heart, interior strength, biblical peace".² This peace cannot be disturbed by distractions or onslaughts from without because it is a peace that transcends all understanding.³

Since my renewed heart is now the home of the Spirit, I can only conclude that its original home must have been the heart of Jesus. In other words, Jesus' heart is the home of the Spirit, and he has given me a new heart because he has granted me his Spirit.

Finally, my new heart will lead me to the new earth and the new heaven. The same Holy Spirit, the stream of living water, will flow not only from my heart, but also in the city of God (Rev 22:1; see also Jn 7:37-39).⁴

Challenging Conclusions

Faced with the mystery of the Trinity, and in utter humility, I realize that in order to renew my heart, *God must first open my heart*, as he opened the heart of Lydia (Acts 16:14).⁵ The Law by itself, and my external observance of it, is not enough. Then, I must receive the word in my heart (Lk 8:15).⁶ Finally, I must keep the word (Jn 8:51), remembering the example of Mary who "treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart" (Lk 2:19). Such a spirituality of the heart is a spirituality of grace (since God first opens the heart) and conversion (renewal of heart).

Furthermore, the renewal of my heart will affect my attitude towards fellow humans. My love of God *and* love of neighbour become one: in the least of the brethren I find Jesus himself, and in Jesus I find God. I find that, in the words of Pope Benedict XVI, "love of neighbour is a path that leads to the encounter with God, and that closing [my] eyes to [my] neighbour also blinds [me] to God".⁷

Life-Changing Lessons

To begin with, *faith in Jesus* is essential in my receiving a new heart or in renewing my heart (Rom 10:9).⁸ Then, believing in Jesus and accepting his word, it is not merely his word that dwells in my heart, but Jesus himself as well (Eph 3:16-19).⁹ This new heart, or renewal of my heart, is the effect of the indwelling Spirit of Jesus (Gal 4:6).¹⁰ Also, it is the Spirit who pours out the love of God into my heart (Rom 5:5).¹¹ Finally, the uncreated, divine love which fills my heart is, incredibly, God's own self. And, because God is unlimited, then God's love, too, is unlimited.

These notes, then, reflect what I have found *informative* in the readings, what has especially *challenged* me, and what I have been *reminded* of for my own life.
